Message From Our Executive Director

Dear Friends,

As a valued supporter, our team is pleased to share our 88th Legislative Session Report with you.

We have been advocating for 10 years, and this was one of the most emotional experiences we've had. We began the session merely eight months after the unspeakable tragedy in Uvalde, and even as we sat in hearing rooms at the Capitol, we were forced to grapple with news of more shootings.

While it's truly appalling that state leaders refused to enact evidence-based gun safety policies despite pleas of Uvalde families and broad public support, we've always known that our mission requires incremental, long-term strategy and stamina.

Thanks to your support, we were able to move the needle and achieve progress: from expanding our coalition, pushing a bipartisan HB 2744 committee vote, and advancing safe gun storage education our work had an impact.

And there is so much more work to do.

That's why we need your ongoing support, whether that means joining us for rallies, testifying in hearings, or donating to sustain our advocacy at the Legislature and in our communities.

We invite you to read this full report, which serves as your guide on the legislative session and the work ahead. Thank you for remaining dedicated advocates.



Safe Gun Storage Victory

"If more Texans practiced safe gun storage, my daughter would be alive today."

-Rhonda Hart, mother of Kim, a victim of the Santa Fe shooting. For years, we have led efforts to expand safe gun storage education, because we know that securely storing firearms can prevent unintentional shootings, suicides, and school shootings like the 2018 attack at Santa Fe High School in Texas, where a 17 year-old used his father's rifle to murder 10 people and injure 13 more.

This session, we worked with Representative Dutton to successfully add a measure to a school safety bill (HB 3) requiring school districts to educate parents about the importance of safe gun storage and child access prevention.

Doctors, parents, educators and more overwhelmingly supported this effort.

After years of advocating for stronger gun storage measures, this is a **MAJOR SUCCESS!** — and it will save lives.

Championing Good Bills

Through testimony, working with lawmakers, and mobilizing supporters, we helped to pass some common sense policies.


B I - We shaped the state budget to advance gun safety by working with Representative Howard to add funding for the Keep 'Em Safe, Texas safe gun storage education campaign.



B HB 165 (Johnson, Ann) - We supported increasing accountability for perpetrators who injure individuals in a mass shooting.



SB 435 (Middleton) - We supported Santa Fe families in their ask to allow survivors and victims access to evidence even if a case has not gone to trial.



SB 728 (Huffman) - We supported bipartisan legislation to require the state to report mental health records for 16-18 year olds into the federal background check system, closing a critical loophole.

In addition to the above, we successfully sent bills from the House to the Senate that would protect domestic violence victims and prevent straw purchases. Next session, we will work to move these bills to final passage.

State leaders disregarded several key gun safety policies, choosing not to hear bills that would establish an Extreme Risk Protection Order ("red flag law") and an Office of Violence Prevention. Community Safety Committee Chairman Ryan Guillen did not put legislation by Rep. Goodwin to require background checks on private gun sales to a vote – a measure supported by 80% of Texans. We will continue to advocate for these policies that are proven to save lives.

Advocating to Raise the Age

This session, we worked tirelessly to pass HB 2744 by Representative Tracy King to raise the age from 18 to 21 to purchase semi-automatic rifles like the AR-15 used to murder 21 children and educators in Uvalde.

Working side-by-side with survivors, gun owners, and Texans across the state, we testified and drove thousands of calls, emails, and visits to key lawmakers.

Our efforts advanced a bipartisan 8-5 committee vote for HB 2744 — an unprecedented victory for the gun safety movement in Texas.

It is beyond reproach that state leaders refused to send this bill to the House floor for a vote despite the will of 76% of Texas voters.

While there is a lot of work ahead, we do not feel defeated. We will continue to advocate for this legislation in 2025 with even more support and energy behind us.





Fighting Bad Bills


Despite relentless work with our partners, the Legislature approved some harmful firearms measures.



HB 3 (Burrows) - Includes a mandate for armed guards at all K-12 schools. Research shows that at best, armed personnel will fail to prevent school shootings and at worst, unintentionally harm students. Because of pressure from our supporters, this provision was initially removed from the bill. However, lawmakers added it back into the bill before the final vote.



SB 599 (Birdwell) - Allows district or country clerks to carry handguns in courthouses



>> HB 1760 (Hefner) - Weakens standards for carrying guns at some locations of school events



HB 2837 (Schaefer) - Bans credit card companies and financial institutions from identifying firearms purchases that could assist with investigations

>> HB 3137 (Isaac) - Preemptively removes the ability for local government to require liability insurance or registration for gun owners

Lawmakers who weakened gun laws in spite of public opinion chose partisanship and special interests over the safety of our families.

Bills We Defeated



HB 175 (Schaefer) - Weaken accountability for individuals who carry guns in prohibited places

HB 249 (Rogers) - Create an armed volunteer school security program

HB 636 (Patterson) - Allow elections judges to carry firearms in polling places

HB 1229 (Harris) - Prevent child welfare agencies from asking foster parents for detailed information on firearms in the home

- **HB 1894 (Cain)** Preemptively prevent implementation and enforcement of Extreme Risk Protection Orders
- >> HB 2705 (Hayes) Allow possession and sales of short-barreled rifles, like that used in the Santa Fe shooting
- >> HB 2960 (Patterson) Weaken standards and accountability for individuals who carry firearms in prohibited locations
- >> HB 3138 (Isaac) Expand firearm carry reciprocity, allowing individuals from other states to carry guns in Texas public places
- **HB 4007 (Slawson)** Allow school marshals to openly carry firearms

45 anti-safety bills did not receive a hearing this session. 9 of 13 bills we opposed failed to pass.

Media Features

Throughout the session, we continued our strong presence in state and national media. We were featured by major news outlets and led multiple press conferences with our coalition to raise awareness of the gun violence crisis in Texas and advocate for change.

Texas Majority to End Gun Violence: Advocacy Day



In February, we helped bring together 600 advocates and 30 organizations with partners including Moms Demand Action and Community Justice Action Fund to collectively call for common sense gun reform in our state. We heard from a diverse group of speakers including survivors, gun owners, veterans, students, and educators. Groups of volunteers and survivors met with every lawmaker in the Capitol. Our gun sense champions encouraged us to continue working hard to make our voices heard during the session — and we did!

IN APRIL, WE CONTINUED THE MOMENTUM AND TRAINED ADVOCATES ACROSS THE STATE ON HOW TO EFFECTIVELY PROMOTE GUN SAFETY AT THE LEGISLATURE. WE WILL CONTINUE TO OFFER THESE TRAININGS THROUGHOUT THE YEAR AND INTO THE NEXT SESSION.

Community Outreach

OUR COALITION

This year, Texas Gun Sense collaborated with Black and Brown-led organizations, faith-based groups, educators, doctors, survivors, gun owners, and more. We added new organizations to our statewide Coalition to Prevent Gun Violence including Texas Impact, **Texas American Federation** of Teachers, and Texas Doctors for Social Responsibility. Together, we shaped the narrative in the media and deepened relationships and coordination among our 20 organizations.

01. Work With Our Coalition

We will continue to expand our partnerships across the state and work together to push for change on a state and local level.



02. Hold Leaders Accountable

We will keep building a sustainable movement that educates voters and holds elected officials accountable for their actions on gun safety.



03. Educate the Public

We will continue raising awareness on solutions to prevent gun violence and the critical importance of safe gun storage and responsible practices.



04. Address the Root Causes of Gun Violence

We will work to reduce daily gun deaths due to interpersonal violence and firearm suicide by addressing root causes, including mental health crises, lack of access to vital resources, and unfettered access to firearms.
